1. Make healthy pet treats and store them in labeled, reusable, recyclable containers. Don't feel like baking? - 2. Recycle dog food containers, including glass and aluminum cans. Recycling creates new products. For example, recycled glass is made into new beverage bottles, food jars, insulation and other construction materials.
- 3. Wash dog clothes by hand in cold water, and hang outside to dry. This will save energy and money.
- 4. Use natural dog grooming products that are free of chemicals that can be harmful to dogs and the environment. One of the easiest ways to avoid chemicals in commercial pet products is to create natural ones made with common household ingredients. Here is a recipe for an after bath rinse: Mix one tablespoon white vinegar with one pint warm water and rub through dog's fur. Rinse again with plain water. This natural rinse with help remove shampoo residue and prevent dandruff.
- 5. Pick up after Fido using biodegradable wag bags. If finding time to keep up with all the waste is a problem, call the Pet Butler of Boca Raton.
